DCM Report:

Alcoholics Anonymous has been affected throughout its structure by Covid. I see our individual members making their Covid choices and our groups exercising their autonomy in making their choices in how they deal with Covid 19. We have certainly been affected with some groups closing or suspending temporarily and with so many of us speaking of covid fatigue, but I do marvel at our resilience. District 8 has done well.

We have moved from a mid-March low point, as I see it, to a rebuild of our Committee. Committee Chairs are picking up the reins and GSRs are stepping up and establishing themselves. While we enjoy the summer it would seem that we are also beginning to move forward as a committee.

New Business:

Committee Reports:

Corrections: ...For those interested in reaching out to incarcerated persons, GSO coordinates a program for correspondence with persons in prison.

Literature: Chair reports ... She has lots of pamphlets - a few hundred.

Meeting Directories: Chair reported...I see it fitting really well with my Newsletter job and suggest combining the two until such time as someone expresses an interest in taking it over...

Newsletter: Chair reported, I...enjoy this job... I do have a concern...I would love to share this job and how I do it with anyone interested in case something happens to me or when the day comes that the position ends. I would love to hear any ideas for helping to make that happen....

Public Information: Chair has a list of places to drop off AA information. It would be helpful to do a survey from the groups, e.g. how did they come to AA and where would they recommend information be distributed. Proposal at Quarterly - offering funds for districts for PSAs and Public Information costs. Zoom workshop for doctors.

Treatment: Chair reports that he is updating the list of places for dropping off information. He will contact Cedars in August. He will ask the hospital their status. He asked a member for help in Bridging the Gap and she offered to help regarding the hospital. Happy to help with distributing the pamphlets.

GSR Reports:

Newsletter Chair

Dear Conference Members:

Several people have asked when the revised Preamble will be seen in print. In keeping with the final advisory action of the 71st General Service Conference, the A.A. Preamble revision replacing the words “men and women” with “people” will appear in the July issue of Grapevine, and its translation will be in the July/August issue of La Viña. Both of these issues will be mailed, and posted online, on June 15, 2021. After June 15, as new Grapevine, La Viña and A.A.W.S. literature or reprints go to press, and as web pages are updated, the language will change wherever the A.A. Preamble appears.

The June issue of Grapevine was on press when the Conference requested the change, so this is the first opportunity to make the adjustment in the magazines.

We’ve also received a number of inquiries about whether this negatively impacts the editorial independence of Grapevine. Please remember that the Grapevine Board, Publisher and Editors discussed this topic for an entire year over a series of board meetings. Ultimately it was agreed that Grapevine has the right of decision and foundational editorial independence. We felt that such a change would affect the groups as a whole and in keeping with Tradition 4, we sought the input from those it might affect by sending the discussion to the General Service Conference.

The topic was actively discussed in groups across the United States and Canada for two years over both the 70th and 71st General Service conference panels. As a result of those conversations the Delegates of the General Service Conference passed a series of votes, in a sequence of events that culminated with the final advisory action requesting:

“The Preamble revision replacing the words “men and women” with the word “people” be presented to the General Service Board for approval as the new revised A.A. Preamble.

Having been accepted by the General Service Board and forward to Grapevine for fulfilment, the Publisher and editorial staff at A.A. Grapevine went to work to carry out the will of the Conference with love and service.

I hope you are all having a wonderful experience reporting out the results of the 71st General Service Conference and thank each of you so very much for your dedicated service.



Personal Story: Diane (name used with permission)

Hello, my name is Diane and I'm an alcoholic. Last June, a bit over one year ago, I wouldn't have been able to say those words. I wouldn't have believed that I was alcoholic because that was something to be ashamed of, not announced. Fourteen months ago, the universe gave me no choice but to accept the fact that I am an alcoholic. A year ago, I drove my car while impaired and had a horrible accident. That day changed my life forever. I sat in my yard and thought about my future. I was scared. I was afraid that I was capable of repeating the same behaviour but wondering how I could get away with not changing it. I believe this type of thinking is the definition of insanity. I decided then to tell my family and friends what I was going through, and within twenty-four hours I had three offers of financial help to enable me to get into a local treatment facility. I was in treatment nine days after the car accident and stayed for seven weeks. My Higher Power was at work then for sure, even though I didn't know anything about the concept of a Higher Power. My Higher Power kept me safe. I survived the accident and so did the other motorist involved and I was given the opportunity to go on a journey of healing.

Since leaving treatment many things have happened in my life that, in the past, would have been reasons for me to drink, but I have been able to get through them and stay sober. I believe treatment was pivotal in my life but my ongoing sobriety is the result of my commitment to the AA program. I have learned to accept life on life's terms and to ask for help. Recovery is hard work but the benefits have been so amazing. My relationships with my children have improved, I don't carry around a headful of resentments, and I live in the moment rather than always worrying about the future like I used to do. I have an amazing sponsor who I know I can go to for help whenever I need it. Even though I have been working on recovery during COVID, I have found many in-person meetings to go to as well as those on Zoom. My life was very isolated and lonely before, but even during the pandemic, I have found a new life of connection because of my continued membership in Alcoholics Anonymous.
